#### Sandhill Crane Fact Sheet for Policymakers

(October 2022)

US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) management of sandhill cranes (SHC) has created a strong, healthy, and expanding population. This population imposes an economic cost on farmers and presents opportunities beyond watching them. A Wisconsin SHC hunt will not impact the SHC population health or birdwatching opportunities.

#### Sandhill crane population: The SHC population in Wisconsin is very strong... and growing fast.

- There are more than 1.4 million sandhill cranes in North America. (USFWS 2022 data)
- Wisconsin's 51,000 SHC are managed as part of the Eastern Population, which is growing 5% per year. (USFWS data)



## 2024: POLICY - CONSERVATION FUNDING

GOAL 2: Reauthorize Knowles-Nelson Stewardship program

For more than 30 years, the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program has provided funding to local governments, nonprofits, and the Wisconsin DNR to preserve natural areas and wildlife habitat, to protect water quality and fisheries, and to expand opportunities for outdoor recreation in parks, trails, wildlife areas, and forests.

Unfortunately, funding for the program is set to expire in 2025.

WWA supports reauthorization of the Stewardship Program and will be actively engaged to ensure that funding for this critical conservation program continues.
